Option 1. Experiencing Marine Reserves (3.5 hours open water with Samara and Vince Kerr) Coastal walk to snorkel a unique marine lagoon. Learn more about taking groups snorkeling. Manta Boarding

Option 2. Whitebait Connection (3 hours session time with Nicki Wakefield)

Learn about how WBC engages the community in freshwater conservation and restoration through two fantastic environmental education initiatives – the Drains to Harbour stormwater education programme, and the WBC catchment restoration programme. We will visit the interesting Te Wairahi Stream in Whananaki where you can participate in and discuss WBC instream engagement. Demonstrate equipment and techniques to monitor waterways with schools and community groups.

Option 3. Mangrove Discovery/Estuary investigation (3 hours with Kim Jones, Roger Grace & Laura Shaft (NRC))

Visit the Whananaki Estuary. Learn estuary monitoring techniques and hear about the life in the estuary and the environmental problems they are facing. Hear about what different communities have been doing about it. Learn about MTSCT's Mangrove Discovery programme and how we are tackling the controversial mangrove topic in the Whangarei district.
